



Metrolink: The Next Generation


One of the most frequent requests heard from our passengers is for more train cars to accommodate the large number of new riders we have seen over the past few years. Take heart, faithful Metrolink riders! You have not gone unheard!

Recently, the Metrolink Board of Directors authorized the manufacture of 87 brand-new lead passenger or "cab" cars, including 33 state-of-the-art cab cars that will incorporate Crash Energy Management (CEM) technology. The new CEM cab cars will be better equipped to absorb and distribute impact forces in the unlikely event of a collision. Metrolink will be the first commuter-rail operator in the United States to use vehicles equipped with CEM technology.

The first of these next-generation cab cars will be delivered to Metrolink for testing in September 2008. Because of the cutting-edge design of the new cars, Metrolink will conduct three months of extensive tests and inspections to ensure that the cars are fully operational and that all systems on board are working properly before the new cars are put into service. After they pass inspection and testing, the new CEM-equipped cab cars will replace older-model cab cars that are currently in use.

Metrolink will also be ordering an additional 54 coach cars to carry passengers behind the new cab cars. Older-model cab cars will continue in service as trailing coach cars.

Metrolink is very excited about these new additions to our rail-car fleet that will help us meet the future needs of our growing ridership.

Railroad Terms of the Month

Grade Crossing: An intersection of a railroad track and another track, a road, walkways, etc., at the same level.

Right-of-Way: The strip of land acquired for use by a railroad for tracks.*

Metrolink is constantly making improvements aimed at protecting our passengers as well as motorists and pedestrians throughout Southern California. Grade-crossing improvements are a priority, and we have invested more than \$70 million to date in projects to enhance grade-crossing safety.

As part of these efforts, Metrolink recently announced an

innovative new grade-crossing safety-enhancement plan in the City of Simi Valley. The plan targets 57 crossings along 65 miles of track on Metrolink's Ventura County and Antelope Valley lines using a sealed-corridor approach to restrict access to the right-of-way along the entire stretch of the track. Several improvements are planned to enhance rail-crossing safety, including the installation of four quadrant crossing gates, longer gate arms, Z-shaped pedestrian crossings, median separators on the streets, locked gates, and additional fencing.

Sealed-corridor planning has been used successfully in other parts of the country. Metrolink will be the first commuter-rail agency to apply these methods to a densely populated urban setting with high volumes of street and rail traffic.

Great Train Adventure

Safety Matters

What should you do if your vehicle stalls or gets stuck on the railroad tracks?

Decide now what you will do so that you won't panic if this situation ever occurs. If your car stalls or is trapped at a highway-rail crossing or on the railroad tracks, there is only one thing to do: **GET OUT!** Get yourself and your passengers out immediately, even if you do not see a train approaching.

If a train is approaching, run toward the train and away from the track at a 45-degree angle. Do not run in the direction the train is traveling, because any debris from the train striking a vehicle may come towards you.

All highway-rail grade crossings are identified by a unique Department of Transportation (DOT) crossing-identification number and crossing location (e.g., Milk St. or Temple St.), and are required to have an emergency telephone number posted nearby. The DOT identification number consists of six digits followed by a letter, such as DOT 178809S, and can be used to pinpoint your location. This number can be found on the signal house (a small metal equipment shed near every crossing), signal post, or fencing adjacent to the crossing.

As soon as you and your passengers are out of the vehicle and positioned at a safe distance from the crossing, call the emergency number. No problem is too small; call the posted emergency telephone number, giving the DOT number or crossing location, if there is any chance that your stalled vehicle could be struck by a train.

If you cannot locate the emergency telephone number, you can call 911 or a local law-enforcement agency.

MetroLink asks that riders follow these guidelines:

- Passengers with any type of valid MetroLink fare may participate.
- Each fare-paying adult may bring up to three children (ages 18 or younger) at no additional charge.
- Transfers for children riding free are not available. If you connect to another mode of public transportation such as a bus or the Metro Red Line subway, please purchase a ticket for each child from the appropriate transit provider. Metro allows two children under age 5 to travel free with each fare-paying adult on bus or rail.
- This offer is only available on April 27, 2006.

Bridge to the Future

Orange County and Inland Empire-Orange County (IEOC) line passengers might have noticed the construction under way at the Santa Ana Regional Transportation Center, a multi-modal transit facility that also serves as an Amtrak station. The \$8.4 million renovation project, funded by the State Public Transportation Account and the Orange County Transportation Authority's (OCTA) local Measure M funds, includes a new pedestrian bridge and platform, which eliminates the need to walk across the railroad tracks between platforms.

When the new pedestrian bridge opens, passengers will be provided direct access from the station to a new platform currently under construction. This new platform will feature several covered waiting areas with benches, a ticket-vending machine, a ticket validator, and a walkway to Santa Ana Boulevard. Towers on each side of the bridge will include an elevator and stairway, and will be themed to match the station building. The existing center platform will be removed, and a fence will be installed between the tracks to close off pedestrian access to the track area. Look for these improvements to be completed by summer 2006.

Later this year, construction will begin on a pedestrian underpass at the Montclair Station on the San Bernardino Line and an extension of the platform at the East

Ontario Station on the Riverside Line. MetroLink wants to thank passengers for their patience during these construction projects.


